Art Gallery and Botanic Gardens

We enjoyed pleasant conditions for our annual adventure to Adelaide last week. We started the day with a guided tour of the Tarnanthi exhibit or a studio workshop. Tarnanthi is a display of works from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists from across the country. It was developed to provide an opportunity to share important stories, to create significant new work and to extend their practice. In the studio workshop, our children created a printing template and then brought their masterpieces to life with paint rollers. After a walk down North Terrace, we all enjoyed lunch in the beautiful surrounds of the Botanic Gardens. Students then walked some of the Aboriginal Plant Use trail. Many thanks to the Choate family for their ongoing support of our Arts program.

We were fortunate to have warm weather for most of our swimming lessons this week. Children enjoyed learning new skills with their classmates at the Murray Bridge Swimming Pool.
